Course Description

This course is about decision making by organizations with an eye toward value creation. Topics to be addressed include the accounting system, ratio analysis, time value of money, capital budgeting, risk analysis, hedging, and capital structure.

Course Learning Goals and Outcomes

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able:

- To understand the difference between accounting data and financial data
- To understand the difference between book values and market values
- To appreciate the difference between income and cash flows
- To understand how to interpret numerous financial ratios
- To understand the importance of the time value of money
- To understand the purpose and techniques of the capital budgeting process
- To understand the relationship between risk and return
- To understand the importance of the capital structure decision
- To understand why capital structure matters and what factors determine its importance
- To understand how to measure the various cash flows to/from a business
- To calculate the present/future value(s) of varying streams of cash flows
- To calculate and interpret net present value, internal rate of return, profitability indices, etc.
- To resolve ranking conflicts between capital budgeting decision variables
- To conduct risk/uncertainty evaluations using scenario and sensitivity analyses and Monte Carlo simulation
- To estimate the costs of various sources of capital
- To estimate the weighted average cost of capital
- To appreciate the fundamental tenets of sound financial decision making
- To appreciate wide range of applications of for financial decision theory
- To appreciate the critical role the time value of money plays in our lives

How This Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% in person. Much of the coursework will be completed in the classroom during regularly scheduled class sessions. Homework assignments will be found in Carmen and can be completed according to your schedule throughout the course.

Pace of course activities: This course is divided into 5 thematic modules. Successive modules build upon the content of the prior modules. Each module will follow a consistent format consisting of individual and team quizzes instructor input, and in-class exercises completed in teams, along with homework assignments.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a [3] credit-hour course. According to Ohio
State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around [3] hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to [6] hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of [C] average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Research shows regular participation is one of the highest predictors of success. With that in mind, I have the following expectations for everyone's participation:

Attendance: twice per week

Attendance of class sessions is strongly recommended and has an impact on your final grade for the course.

<u>TopHat:</u> I will be using Top Hat to take attendance each day and on occasion to document engagement using polling and for quizzing (non-graded). Once you have registered in AEDE 3103 Spring 2024 in TopHat using our **Join Code of 881619** you will be able to document your attendance and participation. When you come into the classroom you will see the TopHat code for attendance that day on the screen or the chalkboard in the front of the room. You will use your phone or tablet to enter the code into Top Hat. When you do that, your attendance will be recorded. Homework assignments

Description: There will be several homework assignments throughout each module. You may work with other students on the homework assignments, but you have to submit a separate assignment.

Quizzes

Description: There will be 5 in-class quizzes. These quizzes will be taken both individually and in <u>teams</u>, that I will assign. Team assignments will be the same <u>throughout</u> the semester and can be found in Carmen.

In class exercises

Description: Given the emphasis on "learning-by-doing" in this course, a significant portion of class time will be devoted to working in your teams to solve problems, make decisions, evaluate scenarios, etc.

Academic integrity and collaboration: Although collaboration is encouraged, your written assignments, including homework assignments, must be your own original work. In formal assignments, you should follow APA style to cite the ideas and words of your research sources. You are encouraged to ask a trusted person to proofread your assignments before you turn them in but no one else should revise or rewrite your work.
