Course Description

Students will be introduced to and gain experience with quantitative statistical models and related analytical methods and their application to food, agricultural, and environmental systems. There is an emphasis on real world application and presentation of the results.

Course Learning Goals and Outcomes

- By the end of this course, students will a deeper understanding of economic statistics, econometrics, and have greater confidence in its application using MS Excel.
 - As a result, students will be able to recall the basics of ordinary least squares model estimation, with its advantages and disadvantages.
- By the end of this course, students will understand appropriate alternatives to ordinary least squares, and when assumptions underlying the classical linear regression model are violated.
 - As a result, students will be able to apply model construction and estimation techniques to agribusiness and applied economics problems.

How This Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is taught in person. Students are expected to attend class each week during the scheduled meeting sessions.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules** that are released one week ahead of time. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 3 credit-hour course. According to Ohio State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of [C] average. This includes studying, reviewing and editing notes, discussing with fellow students, etc. and does not equate to assignments and work activities.

Attendance and participation requirements: Research shows regular participation is one of the highest predictors of success. With that in mind, I have the following expectations for everyone's participation:

Participating in online activities for attendance: at least once per week
 You are expected to log in to the course in Carmen every week. During most weeks you
 will probably log in many times. If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an
 entire week of class, discuss it with me as soon as possible. In the case of emergency
 or illness, contact the instructor as soon as possible to discuss possible
 accommodations at the discretion of the instructor and with appropriate documentation.

In-Class Quizzes

Each class will begin with a brief quiz. Make sure you arrive to class on time! Part of being a good student is being on time, and students who arrive late will miss their opportunity to take the quiz.

Problem Sets

Students will complete six problem sets throughout the semester, due roughly every other week. In these students will develop a range of analytical skills in Excel and JASP. You may spend time in labs working on these with the TA, Eric.

Analysis Project

Students will define an agricultural, food, or environmental business or economic related question that can be addressed using an econometric technique we learned in class. After identifying a valid data source to test their hypothesis, students will estimate an appropriate econometric model to address the question and write a paper describing their results and conclusions. Finally, students will give a brief presentation of their analysis to the class.

Extra Credit

OSU has a lot of resources to help students become better students, including the <u>Younkin Success</u> <u>Center</u> and the <u>Dennis Learning Center</u>. I highly recommend that you check out these websites.

These excellent resources also entail opportunities for you to earn extra credit:

- At the Dennis Learning Center, you can <u>schedule a free one-on-one appointment with a trained Academic Coach</u> who can help you with any of a variety of academic areas like reducing procrastination, note-taking, exam preparation, etc. You will receive 1% in extra credit towards your final grade for attending one 30-minute meeting.
- 2. The DLC also offers <u>45-minute Zoom workshops</u> on a variety of helpful topics. Attend as many of the workshops as you want, and write a brief reflection on the workshop. Include three things you learned and/or thought were interesting from the talk. Submit this reflection

via Carmen, and you will earn 0.5 percentage points towards your final grade for each reflection. Each workshop will typically be given on two different dates to help accommodate your schedule; you will only get credit for attending a particular workshop once.

Academic integrity and collaboration: Your written assignments must be your own original work. You are encouraged to ask a trusted person to proofread your assignments before you turn them in but no one else should revise or rewrite your work.

Late Assignments

You may submit most assignments late for a late penalty of 10% per day after the deadline. These assignments will be available to do on Carmen for one week after their deadline. I do not have any exceptions to this policy (accepting work more than one week late, dropping the late penalty, etc.).

Ohio State has had a longstanding practice of making reasonable academic accommodations for students' religious beliefs and practices in accordance with applicable law. In 2023, Ohio State updated its practice to align with new state legislation. Although students are required to provide notice within the first 14 days after a course begins, instructors are strongly encouraged to work with the student to provide a reasonable accommodation if a request is made outside the notice period. A student may not be penalized for an absence approved under this policy.
