## Course Description

This course is a master-level course that introduces students to key topics of regional and international development. The course starts with the examination of the profound disparity of development among countries and regions introducing. Then, we delve into the historical, political, cultural, and geographical drivers of the widespread growth inequality. The latter

segment of the course focuses on critical challenges impeding economic growth and evaluates the policies aimed at tackling these obstacles.

## Course Learning Goals and Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will:

- (1) Understand the factors contributing to divergent development patterns across regions and countries and develop the ability to assess the challenges and opportunities encountered by policy makers in different contexts.
- (2) Enhance the ability to interpret economic phenomena by refining intuition and mastering empirical techniques, especially within regional and development economics, by reading papers, present academic works, and writing research proposal.



# How This Course Works

**Mode of delivery:** This course is taught in person. Students are expected to attend class each week during the scheduled meeting sessions.

**Pace of online activities:** This course is divided into **weekly modules** that are released one week ahead of time. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

**Credit hours and work expectations:** This is a 3 credit-hour course. According to [Ohio State bylaws on instruction](http://go.osu.edu/credithours) (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 160 min per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 3 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of B average.

**Attendance and participation requirements:** Research show regular participation is one of the highest predictors of success. With that in mind, I have the following expectations for everyone's participation:

- You are expected to attend every class. In the case of an emergency or illness, please contact me as soon as possible to discuss possible accommodations
- You are encouraged to actively participate in discussions with your fellow students and me about the class materials.

## Descriptions of Major Course Assignments

### Class Presentation

**Description:** Each student is expected to present one paper with a 30 min limit during this semester. Papers are based on those listed in the syllabus, and the timing of those presentations coincides with the sequence of the classes. The grade is based on the clarity and quality of the talk.

### Research Proposal

**Description:** Each student is expected to write a 5-7 page paper (12 point font, double-spaced) that describes a particular challenge facing a city in a country of their choice, a brief review of the literature around that particular problem, and the effect of a particular policy or the hypothesized impact of proposed policies that may attempt to alleviate that problem.

### Referee Report

**Description:** At the end of the semester, you are expected to submit a 2–3-page, single-spaced referee report or research proposal. For the referee report, you can choose a paper from the reading list in the syllabus that is not presented by other students or me.

### Class Participation

**Description:** Your class participation will be based on attendance and the extent to which you ask questions and engage with the materials in the class.

**Academic integrity and collaboration:** Your written assignments, including discussion posts, must be your own original work. In formal assignments, you should follow Chicago style to cite the ideas and words of your research sources. You are encouraged to ask a trusted person to proofread your assignments before you turn them in but no one else should revise or rewrite your work.
