Course Description

Critical discussion of seminal and innovative scholarly research in agricultural, environmental, and development economics. In this class we are going to focus on three goals.

- 1. How to figure out what is actually going on in an applied paper
- 2. How to communicate what is going on in applied paper to others
- 3. What is the current state of the literature in applied papers that relate to environmental and health topics.

Course Learning Goals and Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will:

- 1. Figure out what is actually going on in an applied paper. As a result, students will be able to identify the main identification strategy and threats to validity in an applied paper (or for student's own proposed research designs).
- 2. Communicate what is going on in applied paper to others. As a result, students should be able to clearly and simply explain the main idea, contribution, research design, and findings of any applied paper
- 3. Finally, students will learn the current state of the literature in applied papers that relate to environmental and health topics. As a result, students will be able to assess where their own (and other ideas) fit in recent literature.

How This Course Works

Mode of delivery:

This course is taught in person. Students are expected to attend class during the scheduled meeting sessions. Each week some student(s) will present the focus paper and every other student will write a referee report on that paper. We will discuss the paper in class. Where all students are expected to participate. We will have some side assignments where we dive into the empirical topics using code and simulation.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 2 credit-hour course. According to Ohio State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 2 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 4 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of [C] average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Research shows regular participation is one of the highest predictors of success. With that in mind, I have the following expectations for everyone's participation: Participation and attendance in class is essential for your understanding of the material. While attendance of course is not explicitly graded, participation is graded. Descriptions of Major Course Assignments

In-class participation

Description: Participation and attendance in class is essential for your understanding of the material. While attendance of course is not explicitly graded, participation is graded. It will be graded via in-class discussion, demonstrating that one has done the reading, Canvas polls, questions, and other similar activities will explicitly count towards your grade. Course Materials, Fees and Technologies

Presentation

Description: Each week at least one student will present one of our focus papers. Students may present multiple times. The goal of the presentation is to present the paper clearly and simply. You will need to present the paper as if you are the author in an academic conference setting where you have 30 minutes to present. A successful presentation will cover why we should care about the paper, the research setting, the research design, the findings, the limitations, the identifying assumptions, and room for future research. This should be done with as many figures and as little jargon as possible. A good goal is to be able to explain the big part of a paper in just a few seconds to a smart high schooler. This sounds easy, but it's really hard. To be confident that you are explaining the nuances of a paper correctly you really need to understand the pros/cons of the method they used. I will also provide feedback on the quality of the presentation itself, slides tone, audience engagement, etc.

Referee reports and other assignments

Description: Each week every student will write a referee report on a paper as well as a letter to the editor. There may also be other coding assignments where we code simple simulations designed to show how / why a particular method works and when the method may not work so well.

Academic integrity and collaboration: Your written assignments, including discussion posts, must be your own original work. You are encouraged to ask a trusted person to proofread your assignments before you turn them in but no one else should revise or rewrite your work. Don't cheat.

Late Assignments

Please refer to Carmen for due dates. Due dates are set to help you stay on pace and to allow timely feedback that will help you complete subsequent assignments. I will not accept late work without an accepted excuse. An accepted excuse is one that I have approved before the assignment is due.
