COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduction to current economic issues facing and similarities and differences in Middle Eastern countries' growth, inflation, unemployment, fiscal and monetary policy, imports, exports, foreign debt and exchange rate policy.

PREREQ:

2001 (200) or Econ 2001 (200). Not open to students with credit for 437 or 4537 (537), or Econ 4537 (537), or IntStds 437 or 4537 (537). Cross-listed in Econ and IntStds

OBJECTIVE

This course intends to extend understanding of the economic issues facing Middle Eastern countries. Building upon basic principles of economics, this course seeks to introduce students to current economic issues from a regional standpoint to shed light on cross-regional similarities and differences. After covering background information on the geography, culture, and social environment of the Middle East, the course will cover internal situation (e.g. growth, inflation, unemployment, fiscal and monetary policy) and external situation (e.g. import, export, foreign

debt, and exchange rate policy). Throughout the course, we will also discuss current events and issues related to Middle Eastern countries.

LEARNING OUTCOME

Using the knowledge from principles of economics, students will examine current economic issues in the Middle East by bringing into focus the integration of social, cultural, economic, and historical dynamics in the region.

TEACHING METHODS

Teaching methods will include lecture, discussions, and students' presentations.

ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION REQUIREMENTS:

Students' active participations are required in this course. Your grade will be penalized sharply if you fail to attend the class regularly. If you are not able to attend all lectures in person or have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class, discuss it with me as soon as possible.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY AND COLLABORATION

This course will be more interesting if all students get engaged and actively participated in all aspects of the course. This course requires more than the memorization of a few facts and definitions. More importantly, it requires time and reflection. It is therefore advisable to keep up in this course. At any point, if you encounter difficulties to keep up with the pace of the course, ask for help. Below is a summary of the expectations in this course:

- **Exams and assignments**: You must complete the exams yourself, without any external help or communication. However, for weekly assignments, you may use any external help but still expected to be completed on your own.
- Written assignments: Your written assignments, including discussion posts, should be your own original work. In formal assignments, you may follow any [MLA/APA/Chicago etc.] style to cite the ideas and words of your research sources as long as you are consistently using one specific style. You are encouraged to ask a trusted person to proofread your assignments before you turn them in, but no one else should revise or rewrite your work. For group writing assignments, each group member should take turn to write and other group members should proofread it before turning it in.
- **Reusing past work**: In general, you are prohibited in university courses from turning in work from a past class to your current class, even if you modify it. If you want to build on past research or revisit a topic you've explored in previous courses, please discuss the situation with me.
- Collaboration and informal peer-review: The course includes many opportunities for formal collaboration with your classmates. While study groups and peer-review of major

- written projects is encouraged, remember that comparing answers on a quiz or a test is not permitted. If you're unsure about a particular situation, please ask ahead of time.
- **Group projects**: This course includes group projects, which can be stressful for students when it comes to dividing work, taking credit, and receiving grades and feedback. I have attempted to make the guidelines for group work as clear as possible for each activity and assignment, but please let me know if you have any questions.

Exams (40 percent of your grade)

In this course, we will have two exams. Exams are not cumulative. The schedule of all exams is posted in this syllabus, and it is your responsibility to plan ahead and take these exams. Please note that there will be no rescheduling of the exams for any reasons. If you miss an exam, please see the makeup exam policy below.

Each exam will include 30 multiple choice questions with 50 minutes time limit. You have only one attempt. All tests will be given during the class time in the classroom while the exams will be on Carmen. You will need to bring your computer or iPad to take the exams.

Please note that all exams are closed books and closed notes. All right reserved-no part of the exams may be reproduced, distributed, or transmitted in any or used in any form or by any means, including photocopying, recording, texting or other electronic or mechanical methods without any written permission from Department/Instructor.

MAKEUP EXAM POLICY

If you take both exams as scheduled, there will be no final exam in this course. A cumulative final exam is offered to students who miss one of the two exams

A Cumulative Makeup Exam is offered to students who have missed one of the above exams because of a documented emergency case during the final exam week, on Wednesday, April 27, 2:00 pm - 3:45 pm.

All documents should have been emailed to the instructor at by April 25 at noon in to be eligible to take this makeup exam. On the subject line, you should state: "4537_Missed Exam_ Emergency Reason with the supporting documents."

If for any special circumstances you miss more than one exam, a decision will be made case by case. As a rule, a continuous and in time work are required to be successful in this course. If, for any reason, you are not able to keep up with this course, you will better up to withdraw from the course and retake it in future semesters.

GROUP PRESENTATION, AND REFLECTIONS (30 Percent of the Total Grade)

Students are divided to groups of 5 with an assigned group leader randomly by Canvas. Each group will choose a country in the Middle East to study. Beginning from the first day of the class, all topics will be assigned on a first come, first served basis.

You may choose one of the countries below:

Egypt, Iran, Iraq, Jordan, Kuwait, Lebanon, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Syria, Turkey, U.A.E, and Yemen.

You are expected to exhaust <u>all information in the textbook that relates to the country you are studying</u>, and then update your coverage based on recent events. After each group has finalized their topic and subtopics, I may ask you to do some adjustments in order not to have any overlaps of coverage among the groups. I will discuss this with your group when any changes are needed. Subtopics should be selected from the following list. The last two topics can be optional depended on the country and the number of group members.

Economic Growth, Public and Private Sectors, and the Role of the State* Population Growth, Human Capital, and Employment* Capital Market, Investment, Banking and Exchange Rate* International and Intra-regional Trade* Income and Wealth Distribution, Poverty, Social Unrest War, Refugees, and Immigration

We will have 15 minutes for group meetings during every lecture until presentations begin. This way, I can check on your group work and answer your questions. All group members should attend these group meetings. If you happen to be absent in a class meeting, you should inform your group members in advance. If you are encountering unforeseen circumstances and are not able to attend the meetings continuously, you should discuss your situation with me ASAP.

Proposal (5 percent of your grade)

The proposal should include combined outlines of expected coverage during the presentation. For each subtopic, should include the objectives, background information, and detailed information on each group member's expected coverage.

Presentation Slides (5 percent of your grade)

You should use a Power Point presentation and any features of Power Point that you find appropriate for your work. You should review the presentation rubric under course information rubric on Carmen and follow the best practice.

A Power Point file that includes combined slides will be due after the second exam no matter your presentation date. When combining the slides, make sure in the beginning of each subtopic, you include the topic and the name of the presenter in addition to including all group member names in the first slide along with the topic. Each subtopic should include 8-10 slides, not including pictures, graphs, and tables. All graphs and tables should be updated based on the most recent available data. You should check World Bank and IMF or other governmental sites for the most recent available data.

Presentation (10 percent of your grade)

The presentation grade will be assigned on overall coverage, organization, and flow of information. Credit will be given based on the content and the clarity of presentations, and the ability to hold audience's attention. <u>Please see the presentation rubric under course information module</u> on Carmen.

The group should be prepared to answer students' questions related to their presentation. The presentation should be 40-50 minutes depended on the topic and number of group members (8 – 10 minutes per group member). To receive any credit for your presentation, you should attend the class on the day of your group's presentation and be prepared to answer questions. If for any reason, you may not be able to attend the class during that day, you should contact me ASAP to reschedule your group's presentation.

Reflection on Presentations (10 percent of your grade)

You are also expected to listen to group presentations actively and discuss the presentation in your group. Your reflection should be summarized in 1-2 pages <u>report</u> that covers the main ideas covered in the presentation and your feed back to the presenters. If you happen to be absent during the day of other groups' presentations, you should not submit a reflection. To account for emergency absences one reflection will be dropped for all groups.

If you are the one presenting, you should also reflect on your experience by highlighting the positive aspects and challenges you encountered while preparing your presentation.

Assignments (20 percent of your grade)

In your group, you are expected to answer the review questions, discuss main ideas, and add your comments and questions on the material for each chapter. While you will work in group and you may write your report as a group, each group member should take turn to submit it on

Carmen. On top of the report, you should include names of the group members who have been present preparing the report and those who have been absent.

MISSED ASSIGNMENT AND LATE POLICY

You should plan and submit your assignments early as you may encounter issues if you wait for the last minute. Late submission of all assignments is accepted, but your grade will be penalized by 10 percent for every day of delay.

Since you have at least about a week to prepare and submit each assignment, all groups should be able to submit their assignments in time. However, a group member might miss a week of class because of illness, hospitalization, and other special cases. Please note that all such absences should be documented. For these special cases, we will offer makeup assignments on a case-by -case basis.

LECTURE ACTIVITIES: (10 percent of your grade)

Attendance (5 percent of your grade)

I will take attendance in all classes. You are expected to attend all classes in person and actively participate in discussions. If you are not able to attend the class regularly, this course is NOT suitable for you. I will also keep the right to ask you to drop the course if you are not able to attend the course regularly. While a regular attendance is an absolute requirement for this course, I allow for emergency absences that should not exceed twice during the semester. If you miss more than two classes during the semester, your attendance grade will be penalized by 0.5 percent for each additional absence.

Participation (5 percent of your grade)

This is an applied course, and you are expected to participate actively. Students should join the class having carefully read the assigned materials and participate in class discussions. I will ask Top Hat questions and assign active participation grade accordingly. You will receive ½ point for participation and ½ point for correctness. If you receive 80 percent of the average grade, you will get full points for active participation. This way, we account for possibility of missing questions or being absent because of emergencies.

GRADING SCHEME:

When assigning the letter grades for the course, the OSU standard grading scheme will be your minimum guaranteed grades. This means, if you earn 90 percent of the total, you are guaranteed a minimum letter grade of A-. I will curve the grades at the end of the course, only <u>if necessary</u>, in order to make sure at least 20 percent of students receive A/A- and another 30 percent of students receive B-/B/B+.

Each individual grade item to three or four decimal places will be rounded up to a maximum of two decimal places. For example, 26.4357 will be rounded up to 26.44. The calculated total grade will also display to a maximum of two decimals and **no further rounding will take place when assigning the letter grades**. Read this syllabus carefully to learn how to boost your grade.
